"I always pray with joy . . ."

"Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice!"

"... joy in the faith, joy in Christ Jesus"

"But even if I am being poured out like a drink offering . . . I am glad and rejoice with all of you."

The joy of the Christian experience fills the pages of Paul's letter to the Philippian Church. The words "joy" and "rejoice" are used 16 times in this short letter written to Christians in Philippi. But joy does not mean that life as a Christ-follower is easy or comfortable!

Paul personally knew the struggles of the early church. He himself had already faced severe hardships, poverty, beatings, illness, and imprisonment. This letter was written while Paul sat in prison. And yet, in the pages of Philippians, Paul conveys a powerful message about the secret of contentment in all circumstances- a message that is equally important for us today.

The book of Philippians is filled with biblical teachings that lead to practical implications for our lives. For example . . .

- What things of the flesh are you willing to "count as loss compared to the surpassing greatness of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord?" (3:3-11)

We have only scratched the surface of the rich teachings and encouragement found in this book of the Bible. Join us, beginning April 27, as we study the book of Philippians in worship on Sunday mornings, in our personal devotions, and in some of the small groups that meet.

Last month we began looking at the life of Abram We gleaned an extremely important nugget of truth from Genesis 15:1-2a.

"After these things the word of the LORD came to Abram in a vision. "Fear not, Abram, I am your shield; your reward shall be great." But Abram said, 'Oh Lord God, **what** will you give me...""

The truth is that WE DO NOT HAVE the wisdom, energy, or faculties to make it through this life victorious. WE HAVE BEEN CREATED TO NEED our Creator - the LORD!

We must come to the the Lord, every day, with a one word prayer: "HELP!" - God give me whatever I need. I require your intervention to move.

Life is NOT EASY. In fact, as a Christian, we are called to suffer. In Philippians 1:29-30 Paul writes:

"For it has been granted to you that for the sake of Christ you should not only believe in Him but also **suffer for His sake**, engaged in the same conflict that you saw I had and now hear that I still have."

Paul is clear. Hardship and suffering will come. God will use challenging times to shape us and remind us that we need Him.

Over the next three months we will continue to process what it looks like to depend on the Lord. We will answer the question, "What is it that we require from the Lord?"

Here is the outline for the next three months:

1. We Require God's Righteousness - 2 Corinthians 5:21, Gen 3:21

2. We Require God's Wisdom - James 1:5

3. We Require God's Provision - Matthew 6:11, Exodus 16-17

#### **CONNECTING THOUGHTS** — SHARON EARLY



"Tears over Jerusalem"—our Palm Sunday message, seemed at odds with Christ's triumphant entry into the city. But it was a stark reminder to all of us of how Christ's heart was burdened for those he came to save. Do we have that same burden in our hearts for those around us? Do we grieve that others don't know Christ? Do we shed tears for our own community? There are times that I am overwhelmed with all the tragedy, illness and brokenness, and I have tears for those around me. I was feeling that burden on Palm Sunday morning , but then all too quickly I got caught back up in my own life, ignoring these feelings. Why? I don't totally know, but I suspect it is because life is so hard for so many, that if I let myself stay in the midst of the pain, I would just drown. We tend to not want to deal with pain and find many ways to ignore or 'anesthetize' our feelings.

That week I felt fortunate that one of our small groups took on the burden to pray for one of our members who was going through a particularly rough time. This person was someone I had felt a burden for that Sunday morning, but did not know what to do with it. There was nothing I could tangibly do for this person, but I was powerfully reminded that we have a privilege and a responsibility to bring others to God in prayer. "Is anyone among you sick? Let them call the elders of the church to pray over them and anoint them with oil in the name of the Lord. And the prayer offered in faith will make the sick person well; the Lord will raise them up." (James 5:14-15) We do not always know the type of healing that will occur- physical, relational or spiritual- but we do know God honors our prayers. I was reminded by Tina Houser's testimony of people praying mightily for her. People prayed for healing but also for relief from pain and the opportunity for her to enjoy a day at the fair, just to name a few. One of the answers to prayer that she was grateful for was the realization that she was not going to receive physical healing from her disease, but that she could have peace with the realization that this was her life and God could use her because of her illness.

This spring as we study Philippians, I encourage small groups to continue to keep each other in prayer. In particular, pray for people to experience a sense of peace and contentment in their lives, no matter what their circumstances are. As we are reminded throughout the Bible, suffering and pain will be part of our journey due to our fallen world and sin in our lives, yet Christ came to triumph over this and we have been given an incredible gift of eternal life. Let's continue to lift each other up in prayer, and most importantly, continue to pray for others to accept Christ as their Savior and Prince of Peace!

#### NARRATIVE ON THE HEALTH OF MISSION AND MINISTRY - JAN DEVINE AND JANET FREDERICK

Session is using an evaluative tool that the Fellowship of Presbyterians provides for PC(USA) and ECO churches and pastors called *The Narrative On The Health Of Mission And Ministry*. It is part of the way that we and several other church sessions will regularly participate in a peer-to-peer review to strengthen the mission and ministry of each participating congregation. Session has been sharing one narrative question in each month's newsletter, as we evaluate our purpose *to reach more people and together grow in Christ*. Below is Question #5, discussed by Session on 4/2/14: **Describe the moral expression in your congregation – are you more like the world or more like participants in the values of the Kingdom of God?** 

#### Positives-

Elders feel that we look different than the world in the ways and extent to which we serve others.

- Elders have been told by those beyond our congregation that we are viewed as being different than the world and have a reputation in the community as being more of the Kingdom of God; people are being drawn in by our light.
- FPC ministry leaders make a concerted effort to influence our children (Christian Ed, Youth and Nursery School) to adopt and reflect Kingdom values.
- Corporately as a church, we respond generously with financial resources to address the needs of others.
- Session has defined and made known our core values and beliefs: we know what we believe & why.
- While data about the health of marriages and families within the church is anecdotal, people in the church have been serious about walking alongside couples struggling in their marriage/ family to help hold them together and bring healing and hope.
- Small groups and other discipleship opportunities give people a place to wrestle with Kingdom values in their own lives.

#### Concerns-

- Personally, as Christians, we do not challenge ourselves enough in terms of our finances and pursuing a sacrificial lifestyle.
- Our congregation does not reflect the inclusiveness of God's Kingdom ("people from every tribe and nation"). This may be in part because we do not intentionally reach out to other people and include them in the life of our church.
- We need to always fight the temptation to gossip, especially as we may hear confidential information in smaller groups within the church.

Do others see us as being too materialistic as they look at our church buildings?

We do not look much different than the world in how we prioritize our time, esp. putting God first.

Question 1 (12/13 FPP)- focused on the ways our congregation is seeking the welfare of the community to which we have been called. Question 2 (1/14 FPP)– focused on how we have/have not extended beyond our bounds through the establishment of new communities of worship and discipleship, expanding the Kingdom of God. Question 3 (3/14 FPP) focused on evidence of the Holy Spirit at work in and through our congregation. Question 4 (4/14 FPP) focused on the primacy of God's Word in shaping our minds, priorities, and actions.

#### SESSION UPDATE -JANET FREDERICK, CLERK OF SESSION

regular Session The meeting was held on April 2. At this meeting, and our previous regular meeting, we examined some of the overtures that are being proposed for the 221st General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA) that will be held from June 14- 21, 2014 Detroit. Michigan. in Now a biennial gathering, G.A. brings together commissioners and advisory delegates from 172 presbyteries, as well as delegates and observers from around the world, to discuss, debate and determine theology, matters of mission and witness, and polity/ finance. structure within our

denomination.

The Session has been learning about and discussing some of these overtures, and we encourage the congredation to be informed as well. Brief overviews have been developed to describe how things work at General Assembly, the "lingo," and some of the major issues to be addressed. Beginning on May 11, you may access these documents digitally on church website. the Hard copies will also be available at the back of the sanctuary after this The PC(USA) date. website allows you to all available access information: https:// www.pcusa.org/

2014/ and the plenary sessions will be live-streamed.

Action items from the April meeting included:

Gave approval for the pastors to participate in and organize a mission trip to Kenya in February 2015 and made a referral to the Mission and Steward-Committee ship to develop a policy for determining which mission trips we should support and also to develop some guidelines regarding fundraisers for mission trips.

Authorized Tim Devine to engage in discussions with the Boys & Girls Club about the possibility of jointly sponsoring a tennis program again this summer with U-E.

Made a referral to the House Committee to look into how best to maintain the interior of the Monroe House now that it is being used by multiple groups throughout the week.

A number of other important items were discussed, which are explained in other articles in this newsletter. As always, please feel free to Session contact members with any concerns or questions you have that we might be able to address.

#### MARY-EL RINGERS

One of the ministries that has become a valuable part of the music program here at First Pres is the handbell choir, named the Mary-El Ringers, in memory of Mary-Ellen Lewis. The bells have been playing regularly for church services for several decades and have participated in bell festivals, even hosting several bell choir gatherings here at the church. Originally begun as a 4- octave bell choir, a donation from Andrea Wade allowed the choir to expand to 5 octaves, giving more people an opportunity to enjoy trying their hand at ringing.

We have been blessed over the years to have very gifted people leading the choir. We especially want to recognize past directors David Jenkins, Mary-Ellen Lewis, Timothy Wetherbee, Heather Randall, and most recently, Andrea Wade.

After 25 years of participating in the bell choir, first playing and then directing, Andrea has now decided to retire as director. Those who have been part of the music program here at FPC know that musical ability alone isn't enough to make a great director. You have to add large doses of faith, energy, good humor, patience, encouragement, vision, and organization. These are the qualities that Andrea consistently demonstrated as she turned new and experienced players into a ringing team that has enhanced both of our worship services. She was recognized for her faithful service to our music program on Palm Sunday, April 13.

Admittedly, Andrea will be a tough act to follow, but we are confident the value of this music ministry will be recognized and that someone will take over the leadership when it starts up again next fall. However, in addition to a capable leader, bell ringers are also needed. In order to utilize all five octaves of bells, we need at least 13 players. So what are the qualifications to be a bell ringer? You need to be able to count! Several in the current bell choir do not read music and have never played an instrument. You'll also notice in looking at our bell ringers that age is not a requirement. So if you're interested, please speak with someone who is ringing or has rung to get more information, and then watch in the fall for the start-up schedule. This is a fun group that enjoys making music together in praise to the Lord!
