
> Joy and Lament Righteous Indignation and Repentance Revenge and Compassion Fear and Trust Doubt and Worship

Athanasius, a 4th century bishop of Alexandria, explained it like this: "The Psalms have a unique place in the Bible because most of the Scripture speaks to us, while the Psalms speak for us."

The psalmist was not perfect. He sinned in thought and action, just like all of us. But he was "a man after God's own heart" (1 Samuel 13:14, Acts 13:22). He was a man who truly yearned to live a godly, faithful life. And because of that, he refused to wear a mask before God. He knew there was no point in trying to hide from God. And he also knew that God is big enough to handle anything we might throw at Him.

On June 24, as we transition to our summer worship format, we will begin a new series on "The Psalms," that will carry us through Labor Day Weekend. Each week we will get a taste of different psalms- thanksgiving, community lament, individual lament, wisdom, songs of trust, salvation history, etc. We will also provide a reading schedule with a challenge to read the whole book of Psalms this summer.

The beauty of studying the Psalms in the summer is that you won't fall behind if you are away on a given weekend! While it is a series, each Sunday stands alone. A WORD TO MIDDLE & HIGH SCHOOL PARENTS

School is almost over. Nobody else will have oversight of your teens during the day. No more sports to occupy them in the afternoon. No homework to complete in the evening. For the next 2 ½ months, your teenage children are going to have lots of extra time on their hands and less interaction with the Body of Christ.

It will be an important time for you to consciously nurture your children's faith development!

Focus on the Family offers this as one suggestion:

Put God's Word into the context of your teen's everyday life. Walk in his shoes. Look closely at her world. Consider the effect of video games he plays. Listen to the messages she gets every day from friends, television, and social media that challenge a biblical world view.

Have comfortable, yet purposeful, conversations with your children to help them gain a biblical perspective on these messages. Ask questions like these:

What are the promises you saw or heard on TV today? Do you think they are true? What message does that video game convey?

God's Word says that we have the opportunity each day to do things that will have an eternal impact. What do you think we could do today/this week that would last?

On Monday, June 26, our Kenya Team will be starting out on their two-week mission trip. Much of the time will be spent working with Christians there to finish building a church and a children's home for boys.

How can the congregation support this mission work?

GIVE FINANCIALLY

You can contribute financially toward the cost of the church and boys home we will be building. The Kenyan congregation is responsible for purchasing the land and paying for the foundation of the church and/ or boys home. The U.S. congregation pays for the frame, corrugated steel sides, and the furniture. Our share of the cost is \$7,500 for each building.


 Plans to begin the Southern Tier Christian Com-



"Who, me?" you might ask. "I'm not sure I'm ready for all that!

Ephesians 2:10 says this is true of every believer:

For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do.

Verse 9 explains that we are not saved <u>by</u> works, but in verse 10 we see that we are saved <u>for</u> good works. It is God's purpose for us to fulfill the specific role he has for each of us in advancing his kingdom. Like a puzzle that is missing pieces, kingdom work is not complete without all of us doing the good work we are designed to do. S.H.A.P.E. is a tool we can use in order to determine what part we are to play.
