A Note from the Pastors



At the end of January, a team of nine elders and staff folks from FPC:E went to Houston for the annual ECO National Gathering. Now in its 6th year, ECO: A Covenant Order of Evangelical Presbyterians is a movement of 361 congregations, 25 church plants, and 22 presbyteries.

One of the things we appreciate most about being part of ECO is that the leadership is willing to look with courageous honesty at who we are and what God calls us to be. In ECO, we are part of something new and exciting, but we do not have all the answers, and we are still far from what we could/should be. In three days, we were challenged in just about every area of what it means to be the Church of Jesus Christ. Below are just a few ... we challenge you to also spend time thinking and praying about how these truths might impact who we are as a church:

#### The Priority of Mission:

"The church exists by mission as a fire exists by burning." (Swiss theologian, Emil Brunner, 1889-1966)

#### Youth:

"Really good research indicates that almost half of young people drift from God and the church after they graduate." (Fuller Youth Institute)

#### **Unity and Diversity:**

While conflict is inevitable... "Healthy denominations are built on a common theology and may have conflicts because of cultural diversity. Unhealthy denominations are built on a common culture with a conflicted theology." (Ed Stetzer, pastor, church planter, and Christian missiologist)

#### Leadership:

A kingdom leader is wise (Proverbs 16:2), powerful in weakness (2 Corinthians 12:1-10), leads by faith not sight (2 Corinthians 5:7), and sets his/her eyes on eternity (Colossians 3:1-4). (Kyle Strobel, Spiritual Theology and Formation)

#### The Importance of Prayer:

"For my house shall be called a house of prayer for all peoples." (Isaiah 56:6-8)

We didn't come home from Houston with easy answers. But we did come home with:

- A renewed sense of vision and purpose
- The encouragement of the larger Church as we struggle to be faithful together
- Helpful resources to address some of our challenges
- Deeper relationships among those of us who shared this experience, as we continue to do ministry/mission together

The three 2017 Goals were reviewed with information about our success in meeting the goals.


People took time to review and reflect upon areas of ministry and leadership: Brenda Reibson's work as our pastoral intern; the revitalization of Compassion Builders; Tina Ide's new leadership role in Christian Education and Youth: Eric Eiche, who volunteered to be the temporary Sunday morning custodian and is now willing to continue as a church employee; the value and growth of small groups; unpaid staff (Art Davis and Sharon Early); the positive interaction of the church-wide Advent Study and Facebook discussion; the musical leadership and gifts at both services; the new Christian Community Choir; ministry developments at the Samaritan Supper (Worship Team, Jesse Galli); Development of Cornerstone Presbytery; the young adult Climbing Ministry. All of this is made possible by a committed staff and the many people at FPC:E who invest in ministry and mission through FPC:E.

The congregation approved the Terms of Call for the Pastors and the use of up to \$55,000 from the Wagner Fund to support the 2018 General/Local Budget.

I recently posted a picture called *Call us crazy, but Copper and I much prefer a snowy day walk to the hot, humid days of summer!!* Whenever I say I enjoy the cold over the hot days of summer, the majority of people look at me like I have two heads. It is hard to justify to others this preference, when in their experience, cold is just plain uncomfortable. They do not buy my catch phrase, "There is no bad weather, just bad clothing choices!"

Why do I share this? Because I have to imagine that sometimes when we try to love beyond our boundaries, we share Christ in such a way that others can't fathom, from their perspective, how He is the solution to what they are looking for. Cesar Castillejos (ECO National Gathering's breakout "Loving Beyond the Boundaries") had us look at boundaries we might be setting in place which prohibit us from connecting with others.

We need to understand unintentional boundaries we might have from our own: cultural context; family background; personality; hobbies; perceived safety; and how our own faith journey shapes how we think "ministry" should be done.

We need to understand the current cultural climate (what the culture wants), so we can share how Jesus provides.

Today's culture is all about convenience, control, and a culture of cravings. People today want to be noticed, have questions, have a desire to belong, and have a desire to be connected (yet feel very isolated). People today also desire greatness, want to make a difference, and want to know their voice matters. People are searching for an identity. We know our true identity is in Christ, yet that is a foreign concept to those whose god is "self."

Jesus requires us to move beyond ourselves and to cast a new culture of inconvenience, interruption, and inclusion (creating space to bring all of who you are). This can cause insecurity since it is in direct opposition of today's culture. To many it may seem like we are telling them they need to enjoy the cold weather without proper attire and that is not appealing at all! Educating people about proper cold weather clothing helps them to find joy in the cold. In the same way, when we understand cultural boundaries, we can help people discover that although they may lose their individual identity, when they find their identity in Christ, they are actually freed and able to find joy in life.

Cesar closed by saying "Sometimes we think we need to bring our best, but God can deal with the mess! We bring our mess and God fills in the rest." He reminded us that we don't know who will be stepping up to serve in 10 years. The "mess" we see now might be the next future leader of our congregation. We need to be willing to disciple and walk alongside people— wherever they are— and allow them to grow and change into who God desires them to be!

So what boundary do you have that might be limiting your ability to connect to and reach someone for Christ?

#### TINA IDE

This year's E.C.O. gathering called us to consider ways we might renovate our churches. That's a powerful word to use because it's not about starting over or starting from scratch. Instead, it's about using who and what we are to create a better church now and develop hope for the future.

As I reflected on that, the question then became, "*what tools do we have that can help us renovate and improve not just our children and youth programs, but the whole life of the younger ones in our midst?*" The answer to this isn't new or radical. In fact, it's one I believe in deeply but needed to be reminded of again, and, thankfully, it was repeated over and over again throughout my workshops. The most basic and most valuable tool we have is relationships. They are the glue which holds people together— providing support, comfort, encouragement, and community. Moreover, they are statistically proven to influence the longevity of a young person's faith as well as commitment to the church.

Begining to form these relationships is simple. It begins by saying hi, learning names and interests. Then, in time and with commitment, these blossom into sharing faith stories, enjoying meals, showing up for games and concerts, and the list goes on.

If we want to develop in our children a life-long faith, we must purposefully walk alongside them, demonstrating their importance by investing in relationships with them.

# COMPASSION BUILDERS

#### DEREK WASHBURN

With the McKinley House in our rear view mirror and the thoughts of Spring popping in our heads, we are focusing on getting organized for our push

**forward.** We have been contacted for 3 different projects and are in the planning phase for the first that we will get started on in the next week or so. Please be praying for Moira and the time that we will be able to spend with her as we work at her house.

Going to the ECO conference was rewarding for a few different reasons. One was the time spent with staff and the encouragement that being together at a conference can create. Another was the encouragement to push forward through the hard months of winter. I was able to go to a couple of sessions that focused on reaching out to your surrounding community and building relationships across racial and cultural boundaries. While in Houston, some of us were able to go and visit a community building group called Rebuilding Together: Houston. It's a national organization that does exactly what we would like to do. While it is quite large and works on 20+ homes a month, it was quite an informative meeting and I was able to take away some ideas that will be useful for us. Nate, Art, Tina, and I were able to spend most of Thursday working for RT: Houston on a home that was flooded in Hurricane Harvey.

As we begin our next steps I am focusing on these main goals: 1) While working on our next project, keep spreading the word of our ministry and praying for God to lead us to the people who need us most. 2) Working with Endicott Proud and other community organizations to see how we can fit into each other's goals for reaching out and bettering our community. 3) Building a volunteer base that is made up of our members, other churches, and other groups in the community. We want to stay away from burning volunteers out by rotating jobs with as many people possible. 4) Spend time taking

inventory and organizing our equipment and other supplies. 5) Spend time cleaning the Monroe House in hopes to host groups on short trips like the ones we go on down to Honesdale. 6) Focus on creating and seeking short term storage place that is useful for the mission with the hope of someday being able to have a garage that we can share with other needs of the church. This would be much more efficient to work from than hauling heavy equipment up and down the Monroe House basement stairs.

Please help me with prayer for all of these things, especially for the community relationship part. The more involved in the community we become, the more people we can share Christ's Kingdom with.
