A Note from the Pastors



In recent months, we have been studying the early chapters of the gospel of Matthew, in order to discover what a flourishing disciple looks and acts like.

We began with the Beatitudes (Matthew 5:1-12), where Jesus described the attitudes and character qualities that are reflected in the lives of flourishing disciples: poor in spirit, meek, merciful, pure in heart, etc.

In the next section of the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5:17-48), Jesus challenged us to go deeper than mere obedience to God's Law in order to discover God's heart within his Law... so that our lives might reflect God's heart.

We spent Lent immersed in the temptations of Jesus (Matthew 4:1-11), where we saw how his time in the wilderness clarified the nature of the mission He came to accomplish for our sake. We also learned how Jesus faced and resisted temptations in his life, so we might be able to do the same.

This spring, we are going to continue in the Sermon on the Mount to look at the spiritual practices or holy habits Jesus calls us to nurture, so that we might be conformed to Jesus through Train yourself in godliness, for, while physical training is of some value, godliness is valuable in every way, holding promise for both the present life and the life to come.

- 1 Timothy 4:7b-8

the power of the Holy Spirit. Spiritual practices are a means to an end; they are not the end itself. Even though they are things we do, the goal is more about *being* than *doing*. We practice these disciplines because they help us be with Jesus, and they help us be more like Jesus. As Paul wrote in 1 Timothy 4, we pursue these holy habits to the end of godliness.

Our Essential Tenets describe it like this:

"In Jesus Christ we see the perfect expression of God's holy will for human beings offered to God in our place. His holy life must now become our holy life. In Christ, God's will is now written on our hearts, and we look forward to the day when we will be so confirmed in holiness that we will no longer be able to

sin. As the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, Jesus leads us along the path of life toward that goal, bringing us into ever deeper intimacy with the Triune God, in whose presence is fullness of joy."

CONNECT

SHARON EARLY

Each Lent when we do a congregation-wide study and encourage people to consider joining a small group, we post our current groups- both those with openings and those at capacity. I typically get questions about why I post the groups that are at capacity. My desire is to show the larger picture— we are a congregation **of** small groups, not just a congregation **with** small groups.

Here at FPC:E, we are serious about developing flourishing disciples, and small groups are an important part of that process. So, it seems like a contradiction that we want flourishing disciples, yet we have groups that are not able to incorporate new members. Why is this?! It is because we value spiritual growth, and we realize from many years of experience that when groups get too big, leaders struggle to keep focus on this value as they work to keep members connected and lead their groups.

So where does that leave us? How do new people plug in? To be honest, this is an area where we struggle, but as I share with small group leaders, by being aware of our challenges, we are better able to proactively overcome them. On our website we have listed "Characteristics of Healthy Small Groups." We encourage leaders to regularly asses the health of their group and be proactive about addressing any area that is challenging, including group size. It can be more detrimental for a person to join a group that is too large to focus on the spiritual growth of individuals than to wait for the right opportunity.

Generally, we have found that new groups are most successful when people who desire to be in a group come together to form one. We have also had some success when someone feels a call to step away from their existing group to help lead a new group. You might ask, what about groups splitting to be able to incorporate new people? Honestly, that has been by far the least successful, and many times these new groups have not been able to overcome the challenges that crop up.

So now that you hopefully understand some of our background, would you be willing to work with me to be part of the solution to this challenge? If you desire to make group life a priority, this spring would be a great time to "test" being part of a group. There have been a number of thoughts for some potential new groups: from continuing the Sunday morning "No Excuses" group; to some topical groups on marriage or financial stewardship; to intergenerational groups aimed at supporting people of all ages, and in particular, to help our youth develop a "sticky faith" that will remain with them as they grow into new seasons of their life. ENDICOTT PROUD

In the fall of 2016, we did the study "To Transform a City" and began to plug into the group called Endicott Proud. This grassroots organization desires to "transform" Endicott once again into a place where people would desire to live, work, and play. Somehow, I ended up on the beautification committee. I am convinced this is evidence of God's sense of humor, as He uses us in ways that can only point to God, since I definitely do not have a green thumb!

Last summer, as we experimented with a few events and projects, it became apparent to me that the community does need some respite areas that point back to God and his beauty! You may have noticed that we placed some planters on the corner of McKinley and Monroe. As I would water the plants, I was often surprised that people actually took the time to stop while walking or driving by to say something positive. Why would they even notice? I guess when I started really looking around, there are not a lot of garden areas that "pop" with color in Endicott.

For me, I have always felt closer to God in nature and always wonder how people connect in the city with all the concrete and man-made structures. Maybe this is why I ended up on the beautification committee – to help bring a sense of God's beauty and care to this city where our church is planted.

That said, we have a few ways that others from our congregation can help out this spring. On May 5, the beautification committee is hosting a winter brush clean-up day to get various garden areas



around the village tidied up and ready for spring growth (which will also include working on our church properties). Prior to May 5, **we could use some people who love gardening/landscaping** to help design some areas around the church. We would love to have a colorful garden area on the corner of McKinley and Monroe, since it is a major intersection where people enter the village coming off the highway. I know as I have been traveling recently, I really do notice when a community has made the extra effort to place colorful flowers and plants around, along with areas of respite where people can just sit or wander and feel some peace in the midst of their busy lives.

So, whether you are a master gardener or someone like me who needs to be reminded to water the plants, please consider helping us make our corner of the village a mini-God Garden as a reminder that we care about this community!
