## A Note from the Pastors



#### YouTube Faith or YouDo Faith?

But be doers of the word, and not merely hearers who deceive themselves.

For if any are hearers of the word and not doers, they are like those who look at themselves in a mirror; for they look at themselves and, on going away, immediately forget what they were like. But those who look into the perfect law, the law of liberty, and persevere, being not hearers who forget but doers who act—they will be blessed in their doing. — James 1:22-25

This summer, Jan dropped her phone into water. After quickly rescuing the phone, the first thing she did was run to the computer to find a YouTube video so that she could dry it out correctly. (The video was helpful, but unfortunately, her phone was old enough that it was not even water resistant...)

Got a problem you need to fix? Just YouTube it! Chances are, someone out there has recorded a video that will give you step-by-step instructions to solve the issue. There are millions of these tutorial videos. Most YouTube videos are produced by average people who have learned a skill and want to share it. For those of us who are mechanically inept, this crowdsourcing of expertise makes it possible to fix a faucet, change a tire, or install a washing machine. **Of course, all this instruction depends on the viewer's willingness to experiment and put the information into practice**. Without that, it's just another way to waste time on the internet.

People in the ancient world obviously didn't have YouTube. Early Christians learned how to live their faith by personally watching and imitating their mentors, by asking questions face to face, or by receiving a letter from a distant instructor. Protestants believe that James was one of Jesus' brothers (Matthew 13:55, Mark 6:3, Galatians 1:19, Jude 1:1), who came to faith after the resurrection and became the leader of the church in Jerusalem. He wrote a letter to Jewish Christians who had been scattered by persecution, encouraging them to remain faithful in the midst of trial and to demonstrate consistent Christian character in the midst of temptation. James's letter reads like a series of random tutorial videos on Christian discipleship, but in the passage above, James made it clear **that no amount of instruction matters unless it is put into practice**. James wanted Christ-followers to become experts not only in hearing the instruction (word of truth), but in doing the instruction as well. That requires practice. "But be doers of the word and not merely hearers who deceive themselves" (v. 22).

If I need to fix my leaky faucet, I really need to set up my phone next to the sink and follow along step by step with the video. If I just watch the video and say, "I'll get to that sometime," I'll quickly forget everything that I learned in the tutorial. James says the same thing happens when we only *hear* the Word of God and don't put it into practice. It's as though we look at ourselves in a mirror briefly and then walk away, almost instantly forgetting what we look like. Putting our faith into practice is much easier when we develop authentic fellowship within a community of believers. As good as YouTube tutorials are, it's way better to have others standing beside you to show you how to do something or to learn with you. That's how we best learn to be a follower of Jesus—together. So as the Fall calendar of activity starts up again in your lives, we invite you to come and invest in this community of faith— so we can learn and do the Word of God together. We hope as you read this month's newsletter, you will choose to invest in some of the many opportunities we have to do faith together!

#### **DEVOTION**

Ider Chris Galli wrote and led our opening devotion at this meeting, calling it: "What Is Your Biblical Mantra?" He shared his own personal biblical

mantra (2 Timothy 4:7-8), which took on new meaning recently for Chris as he trained for and competed in a triathlon. The experience reminded him that many times our lives consist of several challenging events at the same time, just like a triathlon. Whether it is struggling with our children, dealing with problems at work, relationship struggles, dealing with an addiction or health issues, all of these struggles are part of life's triathlon. But how do you keep the faith? Just like preparing for a triathlon, we have to train and look to the Word of God to give us the answers we need. Training helps our faith grow stronger and brings us into closer fellowship with our Lord. The stronger our faith, the easier it will be to finish the race.

He then asked the elders to share their own Biblical Mantras. Here are some that were mentioned:

Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus (Philippians 4:6-7).

Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer (Romans 12:12).

Search me, God, and know my heart; test me and know my anxious thoughts (Psalm 139:23).

When I am afraid, I put my trust in you (Psalm 56:3).

This summer I was able to attend two different churches with my daughters while I was visiting them in Colorado, and it was amazing how in synch they were with messages I needed to hear! Both sermons revolved around resting in God and regularly starting our day with Him. That's definitely not a new concept, but it's one I constantly struggle with. As has happened before, I felt convicted that this NEEDS to be part of my routine but found I very quickly struggled to change my patterns of behavior once again.

Why do I share this? Because I know I just can't do it on my own. I need others in my life encouraging me and holding me accountable. I want to be transformed and to discern God's will for my life, but when I don't allow margin in my life for God to be at work, I miss many opportunities to hear His voice. One of the sermons had us looking at our calendar and examining how we spend our time. Many things consume our time and they can be good things. But, if we are not intentional about creating space for God to work, our lives will be transformed by the society around us because that is what fills up our calendar and claims our attention.

As you prepare your schedule this fall, be intentional about making being part of a group a reality in your life. Starting mid-September, we will begin a six-week series on Sticky Faith and how being part of community helps all of us, not just our youth, have a faith that "sticks" no matter where life takes

us. Are you willing to make it a priority to be transformed in your thinking concerning community, the role that faith plays in our life, and your role within our faith community?


