Try to read a devotion every day; don't save up until Saturday and knock it all out at once. The format is simple - a person from our Living Hope Community has submitted some thoughts based on scripture.

Journal and/or share with others what God is impressing upon you in this area of Hope!

Pray into it – for our individual lives, for this church, and for our community

Together Let's Look for Ways to Build Hope and Share Hope!

Week 1: Sunday Reading

We have this hope as an anchor for the soul, firm and secure. Hebrews 6:19

When our daughter Jess went away to school, she attended Hope College. One of their traditions during freshman drop-off was to take a picture by the huge blue anchor on campus. A campus representative stood there with a box of tissues to mop up the tears parents typically had as reality hit home that they would be walking away leaving their child to navigate this next season of life on their own. In reality, as long as they had an anchor to steady them, they would not be alone. The same is true for all of us. What is your anchor?

Christine Caine recently posted this thought:

Jesus is the anchor for our souls. Easy to remember, yet it's often hard to live like we believe it. Despite all the pressures we feel in our lives, we don't have to drift. When the currents of life are swirling around us, forcefully trying to move us, Jesus is our anchor. He is faithful to help us resist the drift and stay on track, no matter what comes our way.

This seems particularly appropriate as we start this devotional journey on Hope. Where do you find your Hope? Are you anchored in Christ or are you drifting, being tossed around by any storm that comes your way? I encourage you to take the time during the next six weeks to anchor yourself in scriptures of Hope!

Personal Reflections -

Personal Prayer based on Hebrews 6:19 -

Week 1: Monday Reading

Remember your word to your servant, for you have given me hope. My comfort in my suffering is this: Your promise preserves my life. Psalm 119:49-50 (NIV)

HOPE fills the verses of Psalm 119! Take a moment to read verses 43, 49, 74, 81, 114, and 147. Where does the writer find hope? In the promise of health? Wealth? A trouble-free life? No, he finds hope in God's Word – every time. Whether the psalmist is experiencing health or sickness, wealth or poverty, a trouble-free life or a trouble-filled life, the one constant that grounds him is God's Word. The psalmist chooses to hold onto God's promises of unfailing love, salvation, and faithfulness, no matter what he is facing.

Verse 49 says, "Remember your word to your servant, for you have given me hope." Do you think the psalmist feels like he has to remind God of his promises, as if God could forget? Or is he saying this aloud to remind himself of God's promises?

Remembering God's promises gives us hope and comfort:

"Lord, remember that in your mercy, you promised to forgive me when I sin" (1 John 1:9). "Lord, remember that you promised to be my refuge, my strength, and my ever-present help in trouble, when all around me the waters are roaring and the mountains are shaking" (Psalm 46). "Lord, remember that you promised to give me wisdom when I ask for it. (James 1:5).

God doesn't forget his promises, but I think God delights when we come to him and trusting like little children, say: "Lord, remember your Word. It is my hope!"

Week 1: Wednesday Reading

Here a great number of disabled people used to lie—the blind, the lame, the paralyzed. One who was there had been an invalid for thirty-eight years. When Jesus saw him lying there and learned that he had been in this condition for a long time, he asked him, "Do you want to get well?" "Sir," the invalid replied, "I have no one to help me into the pool when the water is stirred. While I am trying to get in, someone else goes down ahead of me." Then Jesus said to him, "Get up! Pick up your mat and walk." At once the man was cured; he picked up his mat and walked. John 5:3-9

The man at the pool of Bethesda had been an invalid for thirty-eight years. He had been crippled for so long that he had given up hope. Jesus saw him there and asked him: "Do you want to get well?" Because he felt hopeless, he didn't directly answer Jesus' question. Instead, he complained that he couldn't get into the pool quickly enough to be healed when the water was stirred.

Do you feel hopeless about some situation in your life? Are you crippled with worry, anger or unforgiveness? Whatever you're struggling with, Jesus asks you the same question: "Do you want to get well? Do you want to be set free to live the abundant life I promised?"

Whatever our situation, Jesus has the power to make us well. Just as he healed the invalid at the pool of Bethesda, he can heal us. Sometimes the healing is immediate, as it was for the man at the pool. Several years ago, Jesus took away an alcoholic friend's craving for alcohol in an instant. Other times healing is a process. When I was 50, Jesus used this passage to ask me, "Do you want to get well? Do you want to be free of the worry that has crippled you since childhood?" In a two steps forward, one step back process over the next few years He taught me to trust him and turn my worries into prayers (Philippians 4:6-7.) Healing begins when we tell Jesus, "Yes Lord, I want to get well."

Personal Prayer based on Psalm 43:5 -

Week 1: Friday Reading

Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be frightened, and do not be dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go."

One man of you puts to flight a thousand, since it is the Lord your God who fights for you, just as he promised you. Joshua 1:9, 23:10

Years ago when our boys were young and summer vacation Bible schools were a regular occurrence, our former church held a summer Bible school program based on Joshua 1:9. My wife helped organize the teaching materials and logistics for this event, which meant that everyone in our house became too familiar with the title song that went with this verse. Songs are a great way to help us learn scripture, but what probably did not sink in at the time was the magnitude of hope, one might call "blind faith", that is proclaimed in this verse. Speaking as one who is not particularly strong or courageous, this passage comes across more as wishful thinking rather than the command and promise of God to his servant Joshua, poised and ready to enter the land that God had promised the people of Israel. What is even more of a challenge to the weak and timid, is that verse 23:10 promises that the strength of just one who is faithful to the Lord will put to flight a thousand others. How can this be? Not because of anything that we can do solely by ourselves, but because of what God can do through us. My prayer this day is that we all consider what gifts we have, place our trust in the Lord our God who fights for us, and see how God can multiply a thousand-fold what strength and courage we can bring to confront the challenges we face in our lives and in our community.

Week 2: Sunday Reading – Hope in Prolonged Suffering (Part 1)

After you have suffered for a little while, the God of all grace, who called you to His eternal glory in Christ, will Himself perfect, confirm, strengthen and establish you. 1 Peter 5:10

I am learning from others who have gone before me and have been living in a place where the pain never stops, but they have found such joy and intimacy with Jesus. Joni Eareckson-Tada and Michael Easley are examples of people who live with unrelenting chronic pain, but they transcend their circumstances by trusting in God and believing what He says is true in His Word even if it doesn't feel true. They know that their personal experience does not define who God is. His Word defines who He is and how He is. The Joy of the Lord is truly their strength and their confidence and Hope are in God, not their circumstances. They are faithful servants in their ministries.

He can use us to help others from this place even when we can't share the specifics of our circumstances. Joni often uses 1 Peter 5:10 when she talks about her 53 years of being a quadriplegic, living with chronic pain and going through two rounds of cancer. "After you have suffered for a little while, the God of all grace, who called you to His eternal glory in Christ, will Himself perfect, confirm, strengthen and establish you." She speaks of God's faithfulness through the years and how now, looking back, it really does seem like her time of suffering has only been "a little while". That is such an encouragement to me. It is the Hope of our salvation through Jesus that I cling to every hour of every day.

Week 2: Wednesday Reading - All My Eggs in One Basket

Mental illness is such a difficult struggle. There's no blood test to show exactly what's wrong. There's no way to know which medications or treatments might bring about relief or healing. Like other "invisible" or chronic illnesses, much of the time people don't really know you're sick. And often there's not an endpoint. As human beings we all want there to be a time of treatment and then healing, the battle won, the struggle over. But sadly, that's not usually the case, it's ups and downs, and ins and outs, and treatments can take so long before you can even tell if it's helping or not. My struggle with several areas of mental illness has been life long, and without help and strength from God I truly don't think I'd be here today. But He's always been there, to offer strength or comfort or just to hold my hand and suffer with me.

About 6 years ago I finally found significant relief from daily depression due to a doctor who just wouldn't give up! I'm so thankful to God for him! After years and years of tries with various medications and therapy, we finally found the right combination to help me have more good moments than bad, and to want to live to see the next day. I don't know why God doesn't take these struggles away but I trust in His goodness and wisdom and know that someday I'll understand. So even "Though the fig tree does not bud and there are no grapes on the vines, though the olive crop fails and the fields produce no food, though there are no sheep in the pen and no cattle in the stalls, yet I will rejoice in the Lord, I will be joyful in God my Savior."

Because of Jesus, I can put all my eggs in one basket and never be sorry that I did.

The contrast between "before" and "after" are amazing!! A whole house reno feels a little overwhelming but I've done quite a few "before and afters" of furniture. I've been known to stop on the side of the road if I see a cast-off piece of furniture and throw into the back of my van. (The best are the ones with a big FREE sign on them!). I usually start by asking some questions to help me determine the process of restoration:

- What are the strengths of this piece? (Is it an especially or just a strong, sturdy piece?)
- What was its intended function or purpose?
- What needs to be gotten rid of? (toxic, lead paint)
- What can I add to it? (new hardware or paint)
- Does it need to be re-purposed for another use than originally intended?
- Does it need to be strengthened for durability?

One day while driving down the road, I spotted an old dresser on the curb with a big FREE sign on it. It was old, dirty and was missing it's knobs. But, I could see it had potential! Once home I realized it was in way worse shape than I thought. One of the inside drawers had no bottom and the legs were barely hanging on. A good part of the top veneer had been peeled away from what appeared to be water damage. She looked like her best days were behind her. Even a little defeated. But as I said earlier, I love the inspiration of a good "Before and After"! So into the back of my van she went!

The first thing was to remove layers and layers of dirt and grime. With each rinse of my rag, I could see more and more of the original wood grain, but unfortunately could also see more of the scratches and water marks. Next, with the aid of some wood glue and a furniture screw, I securely attached the loose legs. I then called on my carpenter friend to rebuild the bottom and sides of the missing drawer. Then I had to figure out the missing veneer. Years of neglect and exposure to the elements had caused the veneer to bubble and crack. "Too much to patch" I thought, so instead, decided to remove the veneer all together. It was a slow, painstaking process combining heat and water, which loosened the glue underneath and allowed it to be peeled away. If not done gently, with the right amount of heat and pressure, the veneer would not loosen and would damage the plywood beneath, leaving a rough and marred surface. After a long and tedious process, the old veneer was gone and I was able to sand the entire piece. As hard as I sanded, stubborn imperfections remained.

Week 3: Wednesday Reading – A New Creation (Part 1 Continued)

Thinking perhaps a coat of paint would help, I began to apply a layer of soft, blue paint. As it covered the dresser, I began to see a beautiful transformation take place. The unsightly, damaged dresser, now stood firmly on four, securely attached legs. With the layers of dirt cleaned away, it no longer smelled musty. The missing drawer now was fully functioning and could be used as it was intended. And the addition of shiny new knobs provided function and beauty. Since I didn't really need a bedroom dresser, I decided a new purpose awaited this cast-off piece of furniture. I placed it in the entry way to greet family and guests, providing a place for hats, gloves, car keys, etc... The old dresser was now useful and beautiful even with imperfections showing through. It was truly a new creation!

And then it occurred to me, "Is this what God can do in us when we choose to trust Him!"

On his way to Damascus to arrest and extradite Christians back to Jerusalem, Saul was confronted by Jesus, the very One whom he was persecuting. He was blinded and had to be held by the hand to get to Damascus, where he remained blind for three days. Thereafter, what followed was one of the most dramatic conversions in church history. Saul was renamed and became the apostle, Paul. His education and background as a Pharisee, including his Roman citizenship, all contributed to his successful ministry that followed.

Paul's encouragement and expressions of hope for believers are infused throughout all his writings. Such as Romans, where the believer, hope becomes a distinctive Christian virtue related to faith. Where hope, like faith is based on belief in the yet unseen promises of God. (8:24) "For in this hope we were saved. But hope that is seen is no hope at all. Who hopes for what they already have?" Therefore, hope provides strength for the believer facing present difficulties.

In order to really understand what these verses are saying, we need some context. In the verses immediately preceding this Paul says,

"Remind them to be submissive to rulers and authorities, to be obedient, to be ready for every good work, to speak evil of no one, to avoid quarreling, to be gentle and to show perfect courtesy toward all people. For we ourselves were once foolish, disobedient, led astray, slaves to various passions and pleasures, passing our days in malice and envy, hated by others and hating one another."

WOW. Paul never sugar-coats our natural inclinations and, really, our heart position towards God and all that is good apart from Him. He could have summarized and said, "For we ourselves were once...evil." I think we need to let that sink in. We were enemies of God, and children of wrath, like the rest of mankind (Ephesians 2). We had turned aside, and together become worthless. Our throats were an open grave. Not one was righteous, not one seeking God (Romans 3).

Dwelling on this may feel like the antithesis of hope. And it would be, if that was the end of the story. But we know it's not. Because with our God, there is always a

"...but. God ... "

Oh Hallelujah for these words: "But when the goodness and loving kindness of God our Savior appeared, he saved us, not because of works done by us in righteousness, **but according to his own mercy..."**There was nothing righteous about us to cause God to love us. PRAISE GOD! If we didn't earn the Father with our works, then we can't lose the Father by our works!

When we actually believe in the Truth that Jesus (God, himself) has chosen to submit to the will of the Father, by bearing the punishment and wrath of Himself reserved for *us* because of our sin—and that he did this because:

- IT PLEASES HIM TO SHOW MERCY to the ones he created and loves
- It puts on display his perfect holiness and justice that sin would not be glossed over, but that it would be righteously punished

Then, we can have hope. Why? Because none of this was up to us to accomplish. God did ALL the work. In His loving kindness, he chose to show us our depravity and fate apart from him. In His loving kindness, he chose to be our rescuer. And then, in his loving kindness, he "gave us new life through the Holy Spirit. He generously poured out the Spirit upon us through Jesus Christ our Savior. Because of his grace he made us right in his sight and gave us confidence that we will inherit eternal life" (NLT Titus 3: 5-7).

Week 5: Saturday Reading – . . . But, God . . . (Part 2)

In him you also, when you heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and believed in him, were sealed with the promised Holy Spirit, who is the guarantee of our inheritance until we acquire possession of it, to the praise of his glory.

Ephesians 1:13b-14

In Ephesians 1 it says, "When you believed in him, you were sealed with the promised Holy Spirit, who is the *guarantee of our inheritance until we acquire possession of it,* to the praise of his glory."

There it is, in black and white. Those words are HIS words. And now his character is on the line to keep that promise. And if God does not keep his promises, then he would cease to be God. But, he is the same yesterday, today and forever, so our God ALWAYS keeps his word.

We did nothing to earn our adoption into Gods family, and in fact, we were "obeying the devilthe commander of the powers in the unseen world (NLT Ephesians 2)." Yet, in his loving kindness, while we were still sinners, he accomplished our salvation. And then "poured [his spirit] out richly upon us." And the spirit is not just our seal, but the one who "leads us into all the truth (John 16)." And Gods word (THE truth), says that God will never forsake us. He will never leave us. He is the God who put flesh on and dwelt among us. He is the God who said "Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light (Matthew 11)."

In Dane Ortlunds book "Gentle and Lowly," he explains that the greek word translated "gentle" here means "meek, humble, gentle." He says, "Jesus is not trigger-happy. Not harsh, reactionary, easily exasperated. He is the most understanding person in the universe. The posture most natural to him is not a pointed finger but open arms."

And now, let that sink in. His most natural inclination is to draw us in with open arms. That is our God. When the world is quite literally falling apart, and despair feels like all that is left. When evil seems to be winning and we have absolutely nothing to offer. He is the God who awakened us, rescued us, gave us his spirit so we may be led into all the truth, and responds to us all our days with willing, understanding, open arms. For those who believe in him, He is the safest place to be. And just like we needed God to act on our behalf for salvation, we need and can depend on Him to sustain us. We are never too far gone. There is nothing in all the world that can tear us from the grip of his love.

And not only that, but that same Spirit will take every ounce of our joy, and grief, our happiness and sorrow, and use it to conform us to the image of Christ. He does not leave us how he finds us. He patiently, and tenderly molds his beloved to look like Himself. He is so good.

Week 6: Thursday Reading – Grow Where You are Planted (Part 1)

"Build houses and settle down; plant gardens and eat what they produce.

Also, seek the peace and prosperity of the city to which I have carried you into exile.

Pray to the Lord for it, because if it prospers, you too will prosper."

Jeremiah 29: 5, 7

Jeremiah chapter 29 is a letter to the exiles in Babylon from the prophet Jeremiah providing hope to the people while in captivity for many generations under King Nebuchadnezzar. Jeremiah calls on the people to essentially buckle in and live life, because it is going to get worse before it gets better. Jeremiah proceeds to prescribe radical ways to exiles to have hope in the midst of hardship. This was radical for that time and even more radical in today's society where we are falsely told we are always to be happy and life is easy. These lies set us up for failure. As Jeremiah reminded the exiles, hope can be found through the Lord, verses 11-14. True for the exiles, even more true for us today.

I have experienced this hope to grow where planted in my life. Nearly 36 years ago, Sharon and I had a hard decision to make, where to plant after earning our college degrees. The economy in Michigan in the mid 80's was not good. Michigan is where we both grew up with our families and friends; however, jobs where we could be together were not available in Michigan. We had job offers from GE and IBM in the Triple Cities and off we went. We fully engaged in the area, enjoying the beauty and began to establish roots – making friends, buying a home, finding FPC:E (now Living Hope Church), starting a family – we were growing where planted.

Then changes in the area began causing friends to move away; the area transitioned from booming to depressed; and eventually IBM told Sharon her job would be in Minnesota. We chose to stay even though things would look very different. Uncertainties of moving from two incomes to one along with GE being on its third corporate owner did not make this an easy choice to stay; but we buckled in and continued to grow where we were planted.

Even though not what society would tell us to do, but though examples of godly friends at FPC:E, we stayed. God had earlier guided us to FPC:E and there we learned to trust in the Lord and we did. Our faith has grown through these hard decisions and we are thankful for the decisions that brought us here and kept us here in challenging times. By Bryan Early

Week 6: Friday Reading – Grow Where You are Planted (Part 2)

For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future. Then you will call on me and come and pray to me, and I will listen to you. You will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart I will be found by you," declares the Lord. Jeremiah 11-14a (NIV)

As I become less young and my body continues to change in ways I don't care for, I fall on the example I have had though my Dad. Dad has been challenged through physical changes he has had to go through. He has provided a rock-solid example of what it looks like to grow where planted in the midst of physical changes that nobody should ever incur.

When I was in 6th grade, Dad worked at the local grain elevator. He was doing normal activities and for some reason the lift that carried people and equipment from the basement to the top of the gain bins stopped moving. Unknown to him, the cable system continued to run unwinding the lift cables. When he released the brakes to allow the lift to move, the lift fell all the way to the basement since the cables were not taut. The fall resulted in his heals being crushed, forced into his ankles, a severely broken leg and major compression damage to his back. He was told he was not likely to walk again at 31. Through countless surgeries and his fortitude, he regained his ability to walk but has dealt with constant pain since then. In spite of the injuries and initial surgeries he continued to grow where he was now planted.

Dad went to college for the first time since he had entered the Air Force directly out of High School. He lived life as normal as possible including continue to coach and support us through it all. Coaching my baseball teams was done on crutches for several seasons. When in high school, he was in a walking cast and while pitching batting practice, took a line drive to his cast that left a deep imprint of the ball in the cast. He really couldn't hide that he was doing more than doctor's orders. The surgeon was not too happy that he was pitching but Dad was driven to not let injuries define him.

Like Jeremiah challenging the exiles, Dad buckled in and grew where he was now planted, allowing those around him to see there are better ways to deal with what we have been given. It has been a long time since high school, but when I have run into former teammates, they bring up the example Dad set.

Since his initial injury and surgeries, more health challenges came. He has had two open heart surgeries, the first one at 41 due to associated family genetic heart issues, along with more surgeries on his feet and back to help with pain and mobility. He does not ever complain about what he has been given but chooses to overcome his physical situation.

I'm thankful for Dad's example, even though I would never, ever want what he has overcome on anyone. Dad has given me a living example of Jeremiah's radical challenge to the exiles and proof through God that bad situations are better with Him.
